We have had a busy June. We have remained open to some pupils throughout the lockdown. Teachers have continued to support home learning and began face to face sessions with Y10 and Y12. We welcomed back Y10 to school. I would like to thank all staff, in particular our office staff, IT Support team and the site team, led by Scott Hazlehurst our new Site Manager, who have worked tirelessly to prepare the site and ensure the smooth operations of the school.


In Art, encouraged by Mrs Howson, students took part in a poster competition as part of the Refugee Week in June. I am pleased to announce three of our students won some of the top prizes. Scarlett Cockerill won first place in the 12 - 16 years age category, with Amelie Thom winning third place. Uxia Alvarez Touza won the Refugee Week design prize and will have her design used on merchandise to raise funds for Refugee Action York!







In addition, three students have worked with Mr Dring as a part of the Nesta Longtitude Explorer competition. Maisie (Y10), Parnian (Y10) and Jacob (Y7) have been working hard on ClassBot—a high tech, low cost solution to the problem of education isolation. Their design, prototype and business plan for a classroom robot have reached the national final of the prestigious NLE competition which



asks students to come up with innovative ideas that use AI to make a positive impact on society.



ClassBot is incredibly topical; designed on a Raspberry Pi running a python program which connects to a web server, students can log in securely on any device to take part in lessons remotely and includes numerous helpful features such as subtitles. There has been an astonishing 14,000 positives awarded to students in KS3 up to this point from the start of April. This is an incredible number and shows how well the students have adapted to working at home during the lock down period. The science department, for example, have been setting an array of different and creative challenges that students have been getting involved with including habitat building:







We would like to congratulate all KS3 students for working so hard during this time and engaging with the range of tasks set for them across the different subjects. With nearly four thousand tasks set and eight-five thousand submissions from students, it is evident students have been busy. Not surprisingly, there has been a remarkable number of Student of the Month nominations during the lock down period—a total of 300 nominations were received for March, April and May! The winners are below and they all received an Amazon gift voucher as a reward.

Meanwhile, preparations are well underway to welcome the new Y7 students who will be starting Fulford in September. Virtual contact has been made with all the primary schools and the excitement is building. Videos on key topic—such as the operations of the canteen—have been made and small weekly tasks have been set for the prospective students to ensure the transition process is as smooth as possible. Key Stage 4



The Sixth Form Team have been working hard to support our Y13 and Y12 students throughout the last few months. The current and future team have been meeting regularly via Zoom and have been in regular contact with the students in Y12 providing support, guidance and continuity as we move forward.

The most exciting element of June has been the launch of Zoom lessons, with students and teachers relishing the chance to discuss the work being set remotely and ask and answer questions. The use of interactive whiteboard



and chat has allowed students to enjoy the immediate teacher feedback that Zoom allows. The Zoom lessons have been an excellent addition to the remote learning package and we have been able to increase the provision to two lessons per week from this week. With over a thousand ClassCharts tasks set and thirteen thousand submissions, it is clear that our Y12 are busy studying.

As well as working on their subjects, our Y12 students have been preparing for their Next Steps. They have been using Unifrog to research their progression choices, as well as updating their competencies and working on their CVs. Many of them have also created lists of possible courses for further study. Those students thinking of applying to Oxbridge have had the opportunity to attend two Zoom sessions from Mansfield College, Oxford, and another from Kings College, Cambridge. Both were well attended and provided a brilliant insight into study and life at these universities as well as some brilliant guidance about what they can do now to prepare.

All of Y12 took part in a Progression Zoom, guiding them through what opportunities are out there for further study, employment and travel. This also included how to register for UCAS and will be followed up with a Zoom session on Personal Statements run by York

University on 10th July. Ms Booth has been running some face to face Progression sessions in school; these are bookable and there are still some spaces on 7th July so if you would like some further support please get in touch. All the universities have been offering lots of excellent webinars and will be offering Virtual Open Days so please keep a look out for these by going on the university websites.

Finally, we bid a fond farewell to Y13 and wish them all the best for the future. The year group have been fabulous and we will miss them. We are looking forward to seeing them on results day in August as well as Awards evening later in the year.

DRAMA

Drama classes across the year groups have really enjoyed being able to experience live performances through Digital Theatre. Y7 experienced the amazing RSC production of "The Tempest" whilst Y8 saw "The Railway Children" recorded at our very own Railway museum. Miss Greene and Mrs Windrum have really enjoyed looking at the creative work students have completed in response to these productions.



Y9 have produced some fantastic monologues, inspired by research on York Cemetery. Students have been able to complete audio recordings of their work and it has been lovely to hear their performances! Y10 continue working hard to prepare for their written exam but have still been able to create performances with each other using Zoom, What's App and Facetime. Over the Summer, students will have the opportunity to be involved in a creative project run by Dandilion Arts, in conjunction with Fulford Nursing Home, to create a drama pieces that explore the stories of local residents.

MUSIC

Fulford musicians have kept busy during their time at home over the last few months. Y7 and 8 students have been learning how to use music software for the first time, using Soundtrap and Noteflight to create pieces of programme music to represent a bird and a storm. Look out for some of these creative compositions in our end of term virtual concert, which will be shared on the school website and social media pages in the last week of term.

Some of our choir members have also been working with the charity Musical Connections to stay connected with members of the community. Musical Connections runs music sessions in care homes, sheltered housing, and for older people throughout York. Whilst at home, students have recorded themselves performing and created artwork, which has been collated and sent to members of the communi-



ty involved with Musical Connections, to help us all stay connected while physically we are having to stay apart. We look forward to being able to make music together in person soon.
