LGBTQ+ HISTORY MONTH

February is National LGBTQ+ month. The celebration of LGBTQ+ history is one on a continuing and often winding journey towards full equality. This journey has suffered many setbacks while still moving forwards. Organisers of LGBTQ+ History Month have taken the phrase 'the arc is long' as their tagline, from Dr Martin Luther King Jnr's quote:

"The arc of the moral universe is long but it bends towards justice".

We believe that equality at our school should permeate all aspects of school life and is the responsibility of every member of the school and wider community. Every member of the school community should feel safe, secure, valued and of equal worth. At Fulford School, equality is a fundamental key principle for our interactions with all people irrespective of their gender, ethnicity, disability, religious beliefs, sexual orientations, age or any other recognised area of discrimination. It is also unlawful to discriminate because of the sex, race, disability, religion or belief, sexual orientation or gender reassignment of another person with whom the student is associated. We recently installed this poster in a permanent, high profile position in our canteen to make our stance very clear and as a symbol of support for our LGBTQ+ community.

Further mentions must go to the students who have taken part in The Foreign Language





Following this, we wanted to shine the spotlight on four Year 8 boys who have been involved in a fantastic Design and Technology project. The four boys, Sam Fountain, Eugene Loseby, Theodore Barrow and Matthew Musk, entered a National competition

called V&A Innovate. They had to work together to design and produce a product to show the power of design in a fast-changing world. Their innovative idea was to make use of old, left over disposable masks by making a mould from which they could produce recycled writing pens.

Throughout this project the students showed great resilience and determination by working in their own time during lunch and over the Christmas period. They worked diligently to improve on the model creating numerous prototypes and overcoming design challenges. Students thoroughly enjoyed working together on a unique project and see their initial ideas come to fruition. They received some fantastic feedback from the judges and narrowly missed out on making it to the National Final. A big well done to all four of them.



YEAR 10 SUPERSTAR Lily Bradshaw was selected to join the Royal Shakespeare Company (RSC) Next Generation Act on a four day trip to Stratford-Upon-Avon. During the trip she was taught about the play they were planning to put on, Henry VI: Rebellion.

Lily said "On this residential, we not only rehearsed in Stratford, learning the ins and outs of the scenes we were in, but also travelled to London where we met the entire professional, adult cast and worked with stage combat experts who gave an insight into how battle scenes worked and taught us some movement and breathing techniques to portray different moods. We were also put in workshops surrounding the movement needed to carry out large, ensemble scenes and the vocal skills needed to project and annunciate to large audiences. Overall this trip was a wonderful, surreal experience that was unlike anything I have ever done."





Q: What sorts of things drive you and inspire you as student leaders?

Jamie: We want to be able to broaden the scope of student leadership to involve students who want to be active and have a voice regardless of their year group. This is an opportunity to reinvigorate the student leadership body and to make sure that we all strive together to address issues such as mental health and social inequality.
