Hopefully this has helped students to see the range of options out there and it would be great if parents/carers could support with this, by having meaningful conversations at home.

Following on from the theme of post-16 study, Year 10 students had an excellent day out on Alternative Curriculum Day to Askham Bryan College and York St John University to learn about the range of courses on offer.

It was an eye-opening experience for many of them, particularly at Askham Bryan College, to see that future study doesn't necessarily have to be in a classroom, but can have a real element of practical work too. Particular favourites were the motorsport department and equine management.

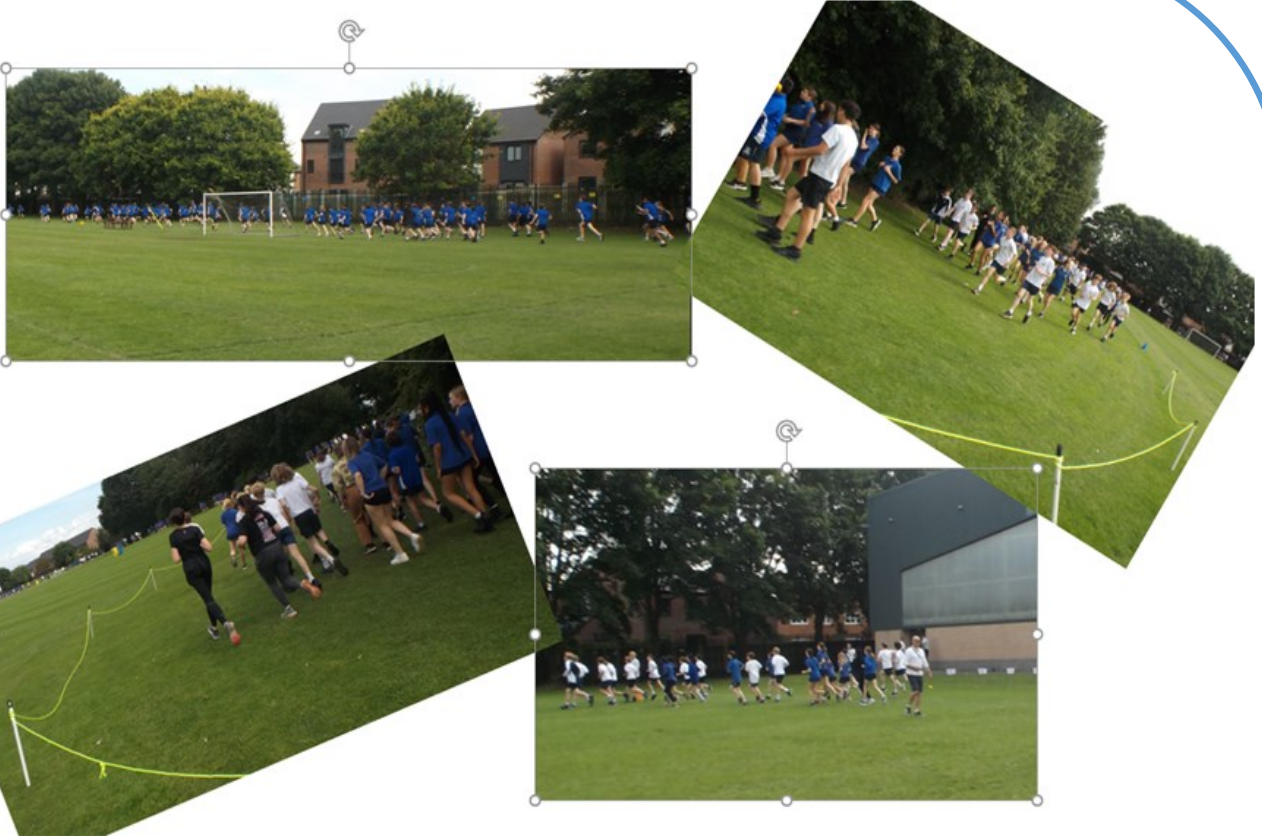
The end of the summer term was capped off with a week of work experience.

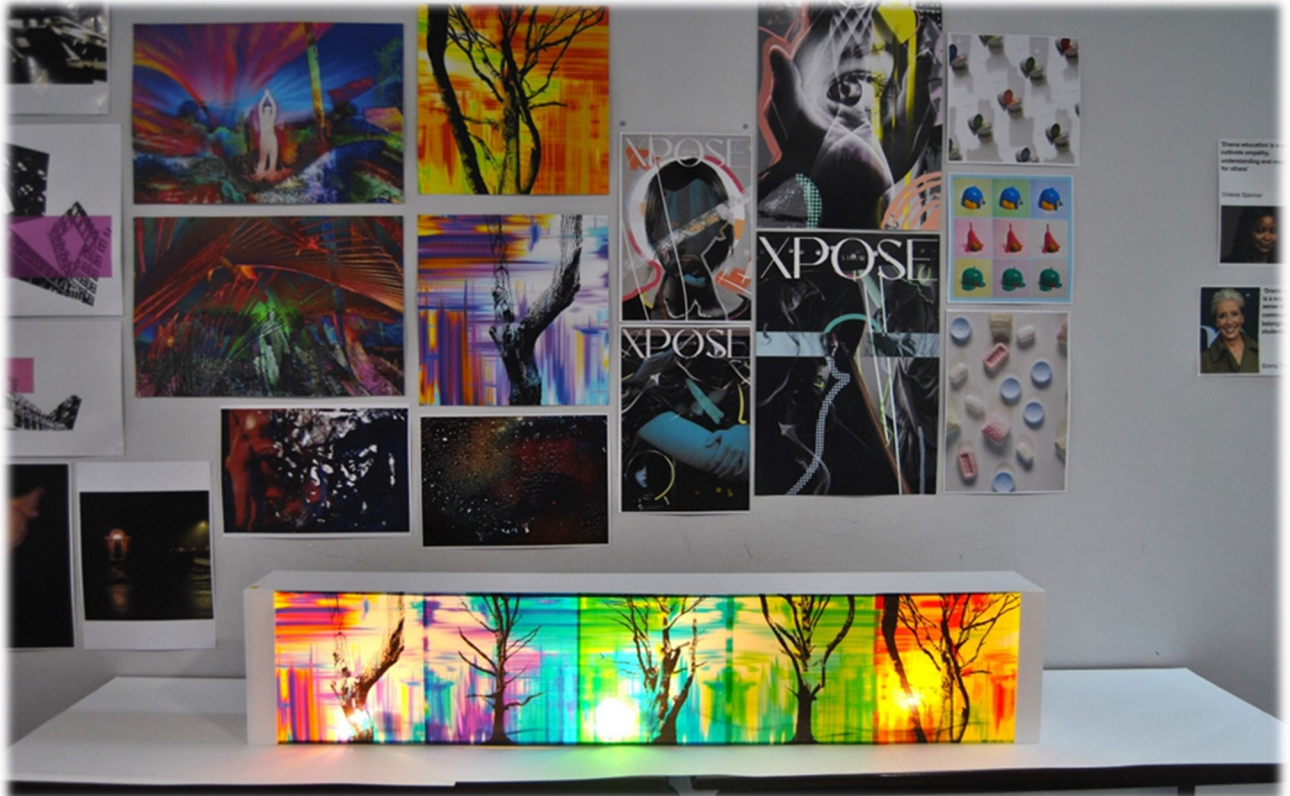

Mrs. James took a group to the AMEY Challenge Cup competition as part of the Women in Engineering event, where they were awarded first place winners!

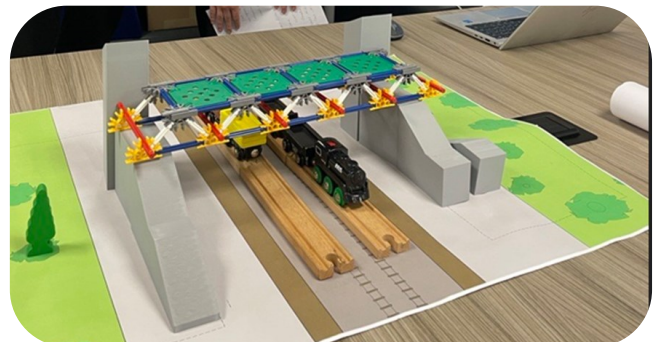
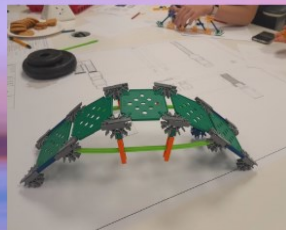

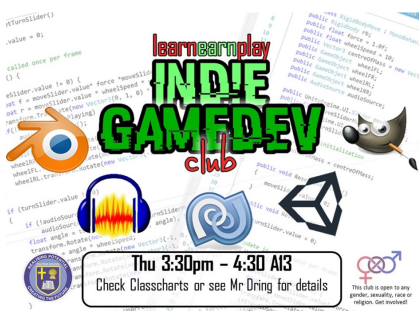
## STEM Club

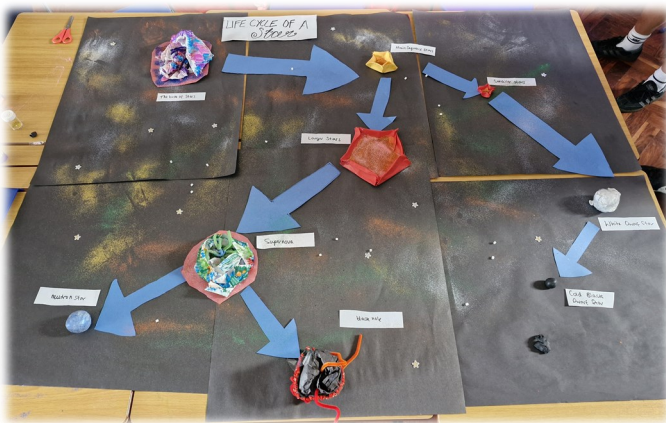

Next year sees the start of a new style GCSE exam and we've been working to prepare students for this – the Year 10s who begin in September 2024, will be the first ones to do this.



Meanwhile, our Key Stage 3 pupils have been continuing their progress with a whole range of different activities.

We always promote the 3 pillars of language learning, vocabulary, grammar and phonics and our Learning Journeys allow us to intertwine these 'pillars' and gradually build up pupils' knowledge and understanding.

While we always have students sitting exams in French and Spanish, we have also had students sit GCSE or A Level exams in a total of 7 other European and World languages this year.

It's been another busy season for Fulford Ultimate. We sent eleven teams to seven national competitions across the course of the year, and we finished in the top two at six of those seven tournaments!

Back in September 2023 we welcomed a new cohort of fantastic Year 7 frisbee players to the team, they have grown hugely across the year and several of them competed on the under 14 first team which reached the final of the U14 Outdoor National Championships.

The Year 8s went from strength to strength throughout the course of this academic year, developing as players and teammates and are in a very confident position to progress into the Under 17 division next year. We had a brilliant group of Year 9s join the team, too.

For the girls, we entered U17 and U20 Junior Women's Indoor Nationals in November – a very long trip to Bristol ended with a silver medal in the U20 division after a fantastic heroic performance in the final left us just short of the title.

In January, we took three teams to U20 Indoor Nationals, and some incredible individual and team performances left our first team with unwanted silver medals and our second team (comprising Year 11s playing up an age group) with a terrific top-four finish.

These two teams represent the pinnacle of performance of the frisbee teams at Fulford School, and it hasn't come easy. Many of these players attend club trainings outside of school and they had all been turning up before school to train from 7am once a week to make use of the school sports hall.

Around the same time, we had a large cohort of our players show huge ambition and courage to attend trials for Great Britain junior teams.

There are four GB teams in action this summer – the U17 Open and Women's teams are competing at the European Championships in Ghent, Belgium; while the U20 Open and Women's teams are at the World Championships which are hosted this year in the UK in the first week of the summer holiday.

Fulford players worked through a rigorous trial process, where the international coaches assessed them (and other trialists from across the country) on throwing and catching skills, footwork, defence, coordination, teamwork, fitness and mentality. Incredibly, thirteen players from Fulford were selected for the GB Junior teams, and we are so excited to see them represent their country this summer.

The team is indebted to the hard work of the staff who make the club possible. Mr Carson runs the sessions every week, and the amazing help of Ms Wood, Miss Hill, Mr Bailey and Ms Eastaugh in planning for and attending the tournaments makes all of it possible.
